

History of "Jesus Shall Reign"

While living on the Abney estate, Isaac Watts devoted himself to a massive project, adapting the Book of Psalms for Christian worship. In it, Watts worked his way through most of the 150 Psalms, paraphrasing them, injecting them with New Testament truth, and framing them in singing form.


He explained his approach with these words: "Where the Psalmist describes religion by the fear of God, I have often joined faith and love to it. Where he speaks of the pardon of sin through the mercies of God, I have added the merits of a Savior. Where he talks of sacrificing goats and bullocks, I rather choose to mention the sacrifice of Christ, the Lamb of God. Where He promises abundance of wealth, honor, and long life, I have changed some of these typical blessings for grace, glory, and life eternal, which are brought to light by the gospel, and promised in the New Testament."

Several of these have become favorites that have withstood the ages. His rendition of Psalm 72 has been called the first missions hymn: "Jesus Shall reign Whereve'er The Sun." This hymn played a role in the life of Eric Liddell, Scottish Olympic hero of the 1924 games in Paris, who became a missionary to China with the London Missionary Society. His departure from Edinburgh was never-to-be-forgotten. His friends escorted him in a festooned carriage from Scottish Congregational Church to Waverly Station where multitudes had gathered. Before boarding the train, Eric spoke to the crowds, saying he was going abroad to endeavor to do his part in trying to unify the countries of the world under Christ. 'Let our motto be "Christ for the world, for the World Needs Christ," he shouted. He then led in two verses of "Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun." If on that memorable day, Eric had sung all the verses of "Jesus Shall Reign," he would have come to this one:

The saints shall flourish in His days, Dressed in the robes of joy and praise; Peace, like a river; from His throne Shall flow to nations yet unknown

Devotional: New Changes and Unwavering Promises

A remarkably powerful windstorm known as a bomb cyclone devastated parts of the Pacific Northwest and Northern California about a week before Thanksgiving this past year. As I saw videos on the news of trees falling and power lines collapsing in the area I call home, I contacted family and friends to see if they were safe. Many people I knew were without power for almost a week but thankfully did not experience anything worse. Nevertheless, many homes, families and communities had to contend with the irreversible damage of the powerful storm. Hearing about this weather-related event drew my thoughts to a passage in Isaiah [43:1-3].

"Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name; you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you, and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior."

In the book of Isaiah, the prophet mentions such storms when writing about the rivers, waters and flames of life. For individuals in our communities and across the globe, these storms are not metaphorical troubles but literal disasters. For the region I grew up in, the bomb cyclone was just one of many unexpected weather-related incidents that have occurred over the last few years.

PROMISES IN STORMS

Isaiah offers us a guide for how to approach these issues as people informed and guided by faith. To begin, Isaiah names that there are waters, rivers and flames to pass through. We cannot confront the most pressing problems of our time if we fail to acknowledge they exist. Secondly, Isaiah says that as we enter into a season of taking on such challenges, God will be with us. This is a promise that should ground our work and keep us rooted in an abiding ethic of love and justice. It is a promise that provides comfort and hope while propelling us into meaningful action and change-making.

EXPERIENCES AND VALUES SHARED WITH ELECTED LEADERS

Two weeks after the bomb cyclone subsided, a group of young adults taking part in an ELCA organized climate summit visited a series of federal congressional offices to discuss the importance of addressing climate change. I had the privilege of getting to sit in at one of the meetings with a staffer from Washington state. During our time together, a few of us discussed the recent effects of the cyclone. The staffer asked how our families were doing and listened to us describe the ways in which climate change has affected our local and global communities. Everyone shared their invaluable insights, and we ended the meeting in prayer. The experience was incredibly refreshing as I watched the foundation for further work being built and established by young adult activists of faith.

SEEKING THE COMMON GOOD FOR COMMUNITIES

Last month as I flew home to Seattle to be with family for the holidays, I looked out the window of my plane amazed at the vast ocean of greenery covering the sacred ground we call home. As we enter into a new year with new changes, may we consider how our advocacy can contribute to the common good of our communities while remaining firmly rooted in the promise of a God who is with us always.

The Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Council met on January 9, 2025 at 6:30pm. Council President, Kristy Patterson called the meeting to order.

Secretary's Report: The Secretary's report was reviewed and accepted.

Treasure's Report: Treasurer Jay Andrews reviewed the December report and it was accepted.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Thomas provided his December report which noted a Christmas Eve attendance of 75. The report was accepted.

Committee Reports:

Stewardship Committee: Coralyn Hudik reviewed her Stewardship Committee Report which will be submitted for the annual meeting report.

Finance Committee: The Finance Committee had a meeting to work on the 2024 budget. It was noted that Larry Fulfs has also joined the Finance Committee.

With no further business, a motion to adjourn the council meeting was presented and seconded. The meeting closed with all members reciting The Lord's Prayer.

Good Shepherd Scholarship Applications for 2025

Applications for 2025 scholarships will be available March 1,2025at the church office. They must be returned to the church office by March 31, 2025. Since 1997, seventy-six scholarships have been awarded.

- I. The criteria for eligibility are as follows:
 - A) Participating member of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.
 - 1. Membership involves having been baptized and/or confirmed and attending worship at Good Shepherd.
 - 2. Participation involves attending worship at Good Shepherd as often as possible and showing a willingness to help with church programs and activities.
 - **B)** Graduating senior presently enrolled in college, or a returning college student.
 - C) Full time student with a minimum of 12 credit hours.
 - D) Student entering an Associate or Bachelor degree program.
 - **E**) Thorough completion and timely return of application.
 - F) Adult student returning for courses toward certification, associates or bachelor degree.
- II. Applications may be picked up at the church beginning March 1. They must be returned to the church office by March 31. Place applications in a sealed envelope marked "GOOD SHEPHERD SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION".
- III. Amount of scholarship depends on number of applicants. Scholarship not to exceed \$1000.00.
- IV. Recipients of scholarship may not reapply.
- V. Scholarship recipients will be awarded.
 - A)'A certificate on Graduation Recognition Sunday.
 - B. Money will be distributed at the end of first semester upon verification of passing grades (end of January).

Decision of Scholarship Committee is final.

January was recognized as National Human Trafficking Prevention Month by not only the US Department of the Interior but also by community partners and advocates such as The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Human trafficking is a devastating form of inhumane abuse and exploitation that affects not only the survivor but also their family and friends. Human trafficking, as defined by the U.S. Department of State, refers to sex trafficking as well as compelled labor. Human trafficking may include "involuntary servitude, slavery or practices similar to slavery, debt bondage, or forced labor."

Presenters at a Northern Illinois Synod Women of the ELCA convention several years ago spoke on the effects that being trafficked had on their lives. These women were not "someplace" else they were right here in northern Illinois. Speak with Sheila if you would like to hear the details that stuck with her after attending this heartbreaking presentation.

Women of the ELCA have been working since at least 2005 to raise awareness, change laws and provide support for victims. In 2021 at the Eleventh Triennial Convention of Women of the ELCA the voting members adopted a resolution setting the four weeks prior to the annual NFL Super Bowl as a time of prayer to end human trafficking and called on women of this organization to engage in prayer. Daily prayers that were available for use between January 13 and February 9, 2025 are available on the WELCA bulletin board as well as online at www.womenoftheelca.org/ministry-action/justice/human-trafficking. No matter where you are, the time of day or what the weather is like, you can pray for all those affected by human trafficking.

Hannah Circle gathered together in January to watch and reflect on the Blue Christmas service that the churchwide Women of the ELCA presented online in December. The music, scripture and reflections provided were not only touching but also a reminder that Christmas is not necessarily a joyful season for everyone. We continue to meet the first Sunday of the month.
