
A Mighty Fortress Is Our God

"A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" "Ein' feste Burg ist unser Gott," is one of, if not the most recognized hymns around; at least in the Lutheran Church. It was written by Martin Luther and based on Psalm 46, it reflects Luther's awareness on our intense struggle with Satan. In difficulty and danger, Luther would often resort to this song, saying to his associate, "Come, Philipp, Let us sing the 46th Psalm."

Martin Luther is thought of as the great reformer, Bible translator, political leader, fiery preacher, and theologian. Be he was also a musician, having been born in an area of Germany known for its music. There in his little Thuringian village, young Martin grew up listening to his mother sing. He joined a boys' choir that sang at weddings and funerals. He became proficient with the flute (recorder), and his volcanic emotions often erupted in song.

In the forward of a book, Luther once wrote: "Next to the Word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in the world. It controls our thoughts, minds, hearts, and spirits....A person who....does not regard music as a marvelous creation of God...does not deserve to be called a human being; he should be permitted to hear nothing but the braying of the asses and the grunting of hogs."

A Might Fortress Is Our God is a difficult hymn to translate because the original German is so vivid. At least 80 English versions are available. The most popular in America is done by Frederic Henry Hedge.



Guide my hands to work as Your hand work, to know the power of Your love in every stitch I make, in every thread I knot. May my hands be guided by the same love and care with every quilt I make, knowing that this love and care was and is and will continue to be a gift of blessing to the one it is intended for.

May the works of my hands be pleasing in Your sight, O, God.

As I choose materials and patterns, may I be reminded of the uniqueness You blessed us all with.

As I cut each length of thread, may I be reminded of the doors that must be closed in our lives so that a new an stronger door may be opened.

As I twist each knot, may I be reminded of a bond of love so strong, nothing will break it.

As I run the thread between my fingers, may I be reminded of the times You have touched my life, my heart, my soul.

As I sew each stitch, may I be reminded of the healing power of Your grace in each of us.

As I concentrate on my craft, may I be reminded of the love and care You put into each of our lives.

As I add my last stitch, tie my last knot, cut the final cord, may I be reminded of the completeness with which You commanded in each of us before we were ever given to this life.

"Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might for in the grave, where you are going, there is neither working nor planning nor knowledge nor wisdom." (Ecclesiastes 9:10)

Highlights Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Council Minutes Sept. 12, 2024

Good Shepherd's Council met September 12 with all members present. Seated were Kristy Patterson, Coralyn Hudik, Virgil Gordon, Donna Gullickson, Michelle Andrews, Dale Gullickson and Darci Meier. Also attending was Pastor Thomas Mosbo and Treasurer Jay Andrews. Devotion and snacks were provided by Darci Meier.

Agenda Approval: Following the addition of several items, the agenda was approved with a motion from Hudik and second by M. Andrews.

Secretary's Report: The Secretary's report was approved following confirmation that the date for Rally Sunday will be Sept. 22. Donna Gullickson moved to accept and Hudik provided the second. All agreed.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Andrews reviewed the August financial statistics which included a gas payment of \$246 and electric bill of \$233.01. Full approval was received follow a motion by Gordon and second from Dale Gullickson.

Guest, Sue Diddens: Council welcomed Sue Diddens, co-chair of the Worship and Music Committee, who presented a plan to offer contemporary services in 2025 on months that have five Sundays. Diddens outlined tentative plans to provide a more modern worship setting that may appeal to younger adults, families and children. Hopes are that the services could encourage growth in the congregation. Diddens said the idea had been presented to a large number of members prior to the meeting. Pastor Thomas requested that the services be respectful of seasons of the year, such as Lent. A motion by Hudik to approve the contemporary services on the fifth Sunday of March, June, August and November in 2025, as presented by Sue Diddens, received a second by Gordon. Full Council approved.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Thomas reviewed his August report of activity and it was fully approved following a motion by M. Andrews and second by Donna Gullickson.

Committee Reports:

Stewardship Committee: V. Gordon stated a second Ice Cream Sundae Sunday will be held October 13.

Dale Gullickson reported on **Rally Sunday** which will be Sept. 22. Sunday School will open the following Sunday. It will be held during normal worship time and it will be staffed by five teachers on a rotation basis. All youth are invited to attend.

Highlights from August 24th Church Council Meeting

Property Committee: Tim Gordon, president of the Property Committee, submitted a report which outlined plans and a bid to repair gutters and fascia on the sanctuary. Dale Gullickson moved to withdraw \$1600 out of the BMI Trust Account to pay Tristate Gutter for replacing the rotted out gutter on the north side of the sanctuary. This includes repairing the fascia and covering it with aluminum. A second was provided by Hudik and the motion passed unanimously. All Committee reports were approved with a motion by Hudik and second by M. Andrews. Council fully approved.

Old Business: Hudik provided an update on progress with the constitution. She stated that a zoom meeting with Synod will be held at Good Shepherd Sept. 16. The constitution committee has received the Synod's list of requested concessions.

New Business: Council fully approved Pastor's insurance with a Gold+ program with Portico as has been done in the past. The premium will cost \$17 more than the current plan. Hudik made the motion to approve the Gold+ plan followed by a second from Dale Gullickson. Clean Up Day will be Oct. 5 beginning at 9:30 am. All volunteers are encouraged to sign up on the sheet posted in the hallway. Projects will be divided among several areas in the church building and possibly some outdoor work.

In another matter, M. Andrews motioned to move \$5,000 from the Special Funds BMI Interest Account to the Current Account as Pastor's housing allowance. Dale Gullickson seconded the motion and it received full Council approval.

The next Council meeting will be Oct. 10, 2024. Gordon made a motion to adjourn followed by a second by Donna Gullickson. Council ended the meeting by reciting The Lord's Prayer.

Martin Luther gave away his lute before he entered St. Augustine's Monastery in Erfurt on 17 July 1505. One friend blamed the decision on Luther's sadness over the deaths of two friends. Luther himself seemed saddened by the move. Those who attended a farewell supper walked him to the door of the Black Cloister. "This day you see me, and then, not ever again," he said. His father was furious over what he saw as a waste of Luther's education.

Martin Luther; when he refused to renounce his writing he became a wanted man!

Luther soon became a thorn in the papacy's side. In 1520 Pope Leo X sent a papal bull threatening him with excommunication should he refuse to recant his views – Luther responded by publicly setting it alight, and the following year was indeed excommunicated from the Church on 3 January 1521. Following this he was summoned to the city of Worms to attend a Diet – a general assembly of the Holy Roman Empire's estates – where it was again demanded that he renounce his writing. Luther stood by his work however, delivering a rousing speech where he exclaimed:

"I cannot and will not recant anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against conscience."

He was immediately branded a heretic and outlaw by Holy Roman Emperor Charles V. His arrest was ordered, his literature was banned, it became illegal to shelter him, and killing him in broad daylight would bring no consequences.
