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#### O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing

Christmas is now over. The Christmas Tree is packed away for another year. The Day of Epiphany has come and gone and we are now in the Time After Epiphany. One of the hymns that comes up in our services in January is "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing".

The Wesley brothers sent word to their sainted mother, Susanna, of their conversion. She did not know what to make of it. "I think you have fallen into an odd way of thinking", she replied "You say that till within a few months you have attained to a strong and lively hope in God's mercy through Christ. Not that I can think that you were totally with saving faith before, but it is one thing to have faith, and another thing to be sensible we have it.

Charles Wesley was very sensible of having it. His life changed, and he gained victory over both his temper and his unfortunate drinking habit. "I was amazed to find my old enemy, intemperance, so suddenly subdued, that I almost forgot I was ever in bondage to him."

He also began to spread the news of what had happened to him. "In the coach to London," he wrote, "I preached faith in Christ. A lady was extremely offended...and threatened to beat me. I declared I deserved nothing but hell; so did she; and must confess it, before she could have a title to heaven. This was most intolerable to her."


New vitality came into Charles' public preaching. He discontinued the practice of reading his sermons, and began preaching extemporaneously. He found a fruitful arena for ministry at the infamous Newgate Prison, and allowed himself to be locked up with condemned men on nights before their executions, that he might comfort and witness to them during their final hours.

As the first anniversary of his conversion approached, Charles wrote an eighteen-stanza hymn describing his praise to the Lord. It was titled, "For the Anniversary Day of One's Conversion," and the first stanza began: "Glory to God, and praise, and love..." Verse seven began, "O for a thousand tongues to sing," inspired by a statement Charles had once heard: "Had I a thousand tongues, I would praise Him with them all."

Beginning with a 1767 hymnbook, the seventh stanza was made the first, and when John Wesley compiled his Collection of Hymns in 1780, he chose this for the first hymn in the book. Congregations today usually sing verses seven, eight, nine, and ten of Charles Wesley's original hymn which we know today as "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing"

#### Highlights from Good Shepherd's December Council Meeting

On December 12, 2024 at 10:45am, Council Meeting opened the meeting with devotions and snack. Check-in followed.

**Secretary's Report:** The November Secretary's Report along with minutes of a Special Meeting Held Nov. 3 Secretary's Report was approved unanimously

**Treasurers Report**: Jay Andrews reviewed the November Treasurer's Report and Council fully approved Treasurer's Report.

**Pastor's Report:** Pastor Thomas provided his November report and noted attendance has grown since the summer. His report received unanimous approval

#### **Committee Reports:**

**Learning Committee:** Council was reminded of the upcoming Christmas Program Dec. 22 and that the Sunday School program is continuing.

**Finance Committee:** Jay Andrews stated the 2025 Budget has been drafted and will be submitted to Council for approval. Andrews also commented that the church secretary's computer is running on Windows 10 which will no longer be supported after October 2025. A new computer has been added to the 2025 budget. Jay Andrews stated that Pastor Thomas had gifted the Treasurer a new laptop as the current computer was outdated and could no longer be updated.

Scholarship Committee: Darci Meier provided the second reading of the Scholarship requirements which was approved.

Audit: Jay Andrews announced that audits for years 2021, 2022 and 2023 have been completed. The audit for 2024 is expected to be completed in January after all December bills have come in.

A motioned was made that all standing committee reports be approved. Council approved.

**New Business:** The date of Jan. 26, 2024, has been selected for the Annual Congregational Meeting. Council fully agreed. It was suggested that all end of year reports be submitted by the end of 2024. The Endowment Funds Distribution was also approved. Donations are as follows: Piece Corps, \$2,000: Voices, \$1,000: Tylers Justice Center, \$1000: Lutheran Outdoor Ministry Center, \$700: Madonna Renewal Center, \$300: Pine Ridge Retreat Center, \$700: Lena Food Pantry, \$300 and ELCA Disaster Relief, \$300. Council unanimously approved. The total of \$6,300 will be paid from the Special Funds Endowment Trust. The 2025 Budget was submitted and reviewed by Jay Andrews, Finance Committee member. A motioned to approve the budget was presented Full Council agreed. The budget will be presented at the annual meeting for congregational approval.

With no further business, a motion to adjourn was made, Council stood in agreement and recited the Lord's Prayer.

The next meeting will be January 9, 2025.

## Answer: John Henry Hopkins Jr.

The Rev. John H. Hopkins, an Episcopal priest, wrote the text of this hymn in 1857 for a Christmas pageant at the General Theological Seminary in New York City. Phillips Brooks, also an Episcopal priest, wrote the text to "O Little Town of Bethlehem" in 1865. Charles Wesley, the brother of John Wesley, wrote the text to "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" in (about) 1739. Father Josef Mohr wrote the text to "Stille Nacht" ("Silent Night") in 1816.
